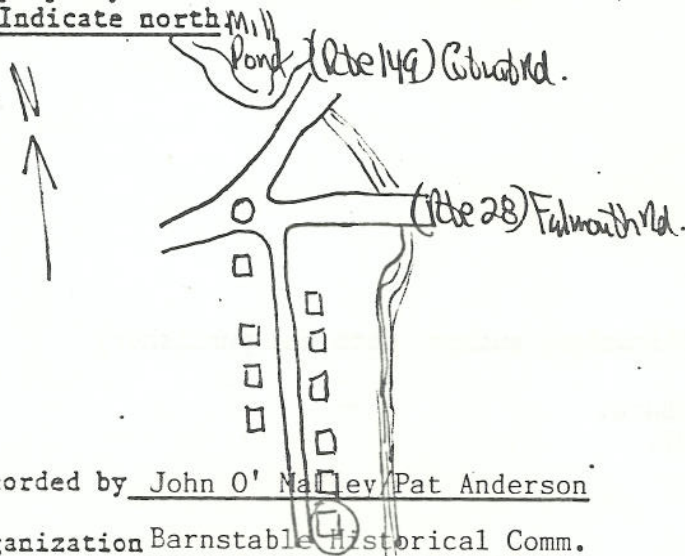

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.)

The Hamblin House is a four square hip roof structure dating to the end of the 19th century. It is sheathed with wood shingles and trimmed with simple cornerboards, fascia, and window surrounds. A hip roof Tuscan porch extends across 3/4 of the facade. Windows contain 2/1 sash. A large side wing was added in the 1960s.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.)

This house originally included the small cottage located just to the north (MMA33). This portion of the dwelling is much later. The homestead belonged to Eliphalet Doane during the mid-19th century. Eliphalet was killed during the Civil War in 1864. In 1887, Eliphalet's widow, Barbara, conveyed the homestead to their son, Ellsworth. It may have been Ellsworth who built this portion of the house. By 1907, George Hamblin was listed as the owner. Mr. Hamblin was at one time 1/2 owner of the Cash Market (MMA 36) and was also involved in the oyster business. In 1938, the rear ell was moved a short distance north, and a new lot was created.
