

The Fish House is a one an a half story bungalow of the type built by local builder Charles L. Hamblin, a rectangle with gable end to the street. There is an open porch on the steet end, built on pillars. The main entry door is at the back of the west side. The house is clad in red cedar shingle, with gray trim. The foundation is concrete blocks. The roof is composition, with a brick chimney on the back of the north side. There is one small outbuilding to the rear (south), a wooden tool shed.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

The land was part of the extensive Jedidiah Jones farmstead which came to the Stephen Crocker family, and to James H. Crocker and his son the Barnstable Selectman Chester8 A. Crocker (James7, Asa6, Ansel5, Isaac4, Nathan3, Eleazer2, William1). In 1928 Chester's younger daughter Natalie9 (1905-88) married Leonard I. Fish (1901-73), and they built this house. Half an acre was deeded to Leonard by the Crocker heirs in 1960. Leonard was a farmer, working in the local cranberry bogs, and growing vegetables and fruit with his father-in-law to the east of Chester's house. These he peddled from house to house in a Dodge sedan c. 1925 model. Later he became farmer for E. K. Davis, the aluminum king at his estate off South County Road. Leonard was son of Albert Thomas Fish (Hervey, Ezra) of W. Barnstable, and his wife Hannah Amelia Jenkins, the local midwife. Both Leonard and Natalie are buried in Marstons Mills Cemetery.

Leonard and Natalie had no children, and Natalie sold the house in 1978 for \$22,500 to the current owner, Charles R. Lewis and his wife Patricia. Lewis became Assistant Dog Officer of the town in 1983, and in 1984 became Dog Officer, now called Animal Control Officer for the town.
