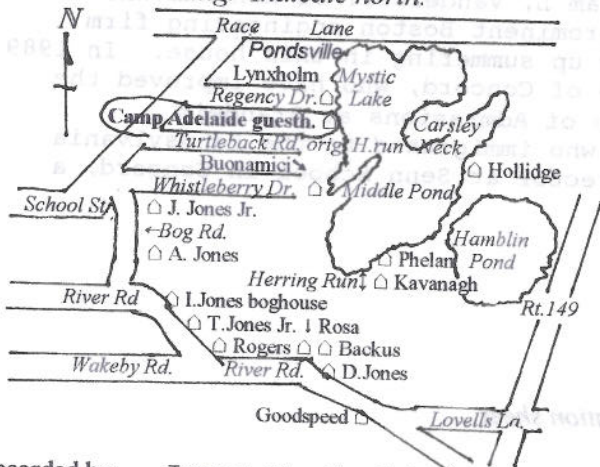

# BUILDING FORM

## ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

The house is a small vernacular style cottage of one story, three rooms, on an ell plan, with living room gable to the north, and open deck facing the water, and two rooms in a cross gable to the west. The exterior is cedar shingle painted grey, with dark grey trim. The foundation is concrete block, the roof composition shingle, with two brick chimneys.

The most unusual feature of the house is the shingling inside the roof of the living room, done by Charles E. Hamblin in 1937.

## HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

Following the death of the builder of Camp Adelaide, Maurice Klouse, in 1931, the place was purchased by Alice M. Nelles. At this time (1932) this guesthouse was built, by the local builder Charles L. Hamblin, whose nephew Charles E. Hamblin worked on the house. In 1937 the whole estate went to Lincoln Filene with the main house renamed "Lynxholm", which burned down and replaced in 1953. The guesthouse continued a part of the estate until 1971 when Peter Thompson subdivided it. Thompson sold in 1973 to Daniel J. Doherty and L. John Raffo of 151 Tremont St., Boston. After one year they sold it to Phyllis A. and John T. Cardis of Westfield NJ.

They sold it in 1981 to Catherine M. and William L. Vanderweil of Hingham who added the deck and modernized it. He was partner of the prominent Boston engineering firm Vanderweil Associates. The Vanderweil children grew up summering in this house. In 1989 Vanderweil sold it to the present owners David Gould of Concord, who have improved the house while keeping the original form. David is Dean of Admissions at Brandeis University, son of William Clark, Thomas V.2 Gould who immigrated to the Pennsylvania coal fields from Wales. Kirsten is a theatrical director at Senn School in Concord, a boys school.
