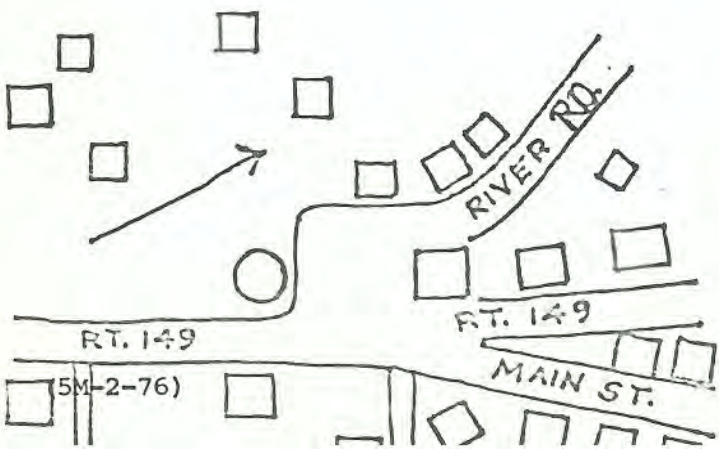

GIVE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF SUBJECT MATTER AND/OR DESIGN OF MONUMENT

The monument is a large boulder of undressed granite with a bronze plaque on the face. Two American flags in standards are set at the sides. Two tall evergreens are planted at the side. The memorial is set on a grassed plot edged with granite curbing near the village green. Slightly to one side on the plot stands an antique granite watering trough and pump. The names of the veterans of World Wars I & II are on the plaque, 86 in all, from Marstons Mills.

The following is condensed from a news article which ran in the "Cape Cod Standard Times" Nov. 28, 1949 headed: "Marstons Mills Rites Honor War Veterans": Dedicated 11/27/49 to war veterans of Marstons Mills Barnstable County Sheriff Donald P. Tulloch spoke to 200 spectators and participants. Invocation was given by Rev. Peter Palches of Osterville Community Church. Maurice Hinckley, chairman of the memorial committee spoke followed by Sheriff Tulloch. Thomas Papp, a Marstons Mills boy who daily raises and lowers the colors on the village green was recognized and presented an award by the memorial committee. Rep. Allan Jones of Barnstable also spoke and the Chairman of the Barnstable selectmen, Chester A. Crocker, unveiled the monument and gave a short talk. A moment of silence was observed for Sherman Crocker who was killed in action in WWII. Benediction was given by Rev. John Driscoll, curate of Our Lady of Assumption Church of Osterville. Following ceremonies, participants of the parade adjourned to the Methodist Church for refreshments.
