ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

This is a one story vernacular Colonial Revival cottage on 26 x 28 foundation, with a small addition on the east side. There are three bays, with centered entrance between two windows, one of which is doubled. On the south roof are two shed dormers. The exterior is cedar shingle stained gray, with white trim.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

In 1930 a one acre lot on the west side of Round Pond was sold by Allen H. Crocker. The deed describes this as part of a field deeded by Abner Hinckley to Isaac Crocker Jr. in 1792, the record having burned, but rerecorded in 1829. Wilbur Cushing believes this was originally land of James Hamblin. The west boundary was a 174 foot "Watering Lane" from the road down to the pond, which is now a Town Way to Water.

The purchaser was Irving H. Livingston of Marstons Mills, a Baptist missionary who lived on Spring St. in Hyannis, intending this as a fishing camp. That it was built by 1933 is shown in a mortgage of Aug. 1933. It was built with remnant WPA lumber. We know nothing of Livingston's origin except that his mother Grace Livingston lived in Queens NY and he had a daughter Grace Livingston. He first appeared in Osterville in 1927 when he led fellowship meetings at the Baptist church. His wife Mabel R. Ormsby (1898-1976) was the the daughter of Ada Ormsby who lived on the south side of the Pamet River in Truro. The Livingstons bought land in Harwich in 1953 where they moved until her death.

Meanwhile, during World War II (1944) the Livingstons sold this shack to Charles and Mildred Farah of Rockland. It is not known whether they made any changes before they sold it in 1959 to Marie (or Mary) G. Elmore (ca. 1892-1980) of East Boston. It was in bad shape at this time. She was the only woman telephone supervisor for Bell Telephone in Boston, and came here in summers from her home in Melrose. In 1986 it was winterized with new flooring. It was inherited by her sister "Nellie" Eleanor F. McAdams (1890-1990), then by her grandchildren John M. Elmore and his wife Geraldine who paid the estate \$120,000 in 1992.

The house was sold in 2005 for \$463,000 to the current owners, builder Edward J. Morgan (b. 1959) and his wife, college instructor Debora R. (b. 1956) Morgan, who live next door at #636 Old Falmouth Rd. In 2005 he installed new windows, doors and shingles at an estimated cost of \$20,000. It is currently rented to tenants.
