### IN MEMORIAM



The Society pays tribute to the late Rick Presbrey, its President for a short 5 months, for his many contributions to Cape Cod and local Marstons Mills life. He had a highly successful career in the development of housing in several locations, and had been active in the discussions in the Town about how to manage the needs for affordable housing in the region. He was a dedicated member of the Society as well as the Village Association, and had been in the midst of planning a Society program for Fall 2025 about the history of transportation on Cape Cod, based on careful research with historic local maps. His obituary in the local newspapers in mid-June details the many other contributions which he made in his lifetime. We extend deep condolences to his family.



The Society also lost another long-term faithful member and supporter. Dianne K. Potter, our archivist, passed away on July 19th. Her memory will be honored officially by the naming of our archives as "The Dianne Potter Archives", with a permanent sign at the entrance to the archives for every researcher to appreciate her significant work of preservation. Dianne held a Masters in Library and Information Science and loved the research and discovery of family and community history. In 2010 she earned a certificate of Geneological Research from Boston University. We extend deep condolences to her family.



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### **CAPE VERDE MUSEUM**



At its February meeting, a "field visit" took place for several members to see the relatively new Cape Verde Museum, located in Falmouth. Museum Director Barbara Burgo led an intriguing tour of the artifacts in the museum, documenting the arrival of citizens from Cape Verde into southeastern Massachusetts in the 19th century and afterward, illustrating how residents with Cape Verde roots have integrated into many parts of Cape Cod life. A visit to the museum is highly recommended for everyone to appreciate the stories and historical items from this history.

# FRENCH CABLE MUSEUM



Following the Society's Annual Meeting in January at which officers were elected for the year, the membership enjoyed a presentation from the director of the French Cable Museum in Orleans. The fascinating and important history of this Atlantic entry point for the cross-Atlantic cable from France in the last century is included in a facility that is well worth a personal visit as part of not only Cape Cod history but also national history as well.

# **CRANBERRY HISTORY**



The history of the cranberry industry in not only the Mills but throughout our region was the subject of the March meeting of the Society. David Martin traced that history from before the 19th century to the present, pointing out that early development was by individual farmers with small holdings. By the late 1800s Abel Makepeace (1832-1916), a Mills resident for a time, became known as the "Cranberry King" and transformed cranberry growing into a thriving enterprise. In more recent years, the indus-

try has entered somewhat of a decline due to several factors, but is still an important and popular food product.

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# CRANBERRY HISTORY CONT'D

Cranberries can be grown successfully only in a few regions due to the need for certain aspects of climate, the presence of sand, and other soil qualities—being limited to southeastern Massachusetts, New Jersey, upper mid-west, and one area of the west coast. Some local cranberry bogs are now being allowed to revert to wetlands as a positive environmental measure which also will benefit water flow.

# HISTORIC PUBLIC BUILDINGS



April's meeting featured Barnstable Facilities Manager David Anthony describing the history of town buildings for the entire town of Barnstable. An example of little-known history is the location of the original Town Hall at the intersection of Old Stage Road and Oak Street, on the site occupied by the present Veritas Academy school. The history of other buildings was included also, and his presentation was a complement to the Fall 2024 presentation that had provided the Society with information by Barnstable Historical Commission Chair (and Society member)

Bob Frazee. These two presentations rounded out a thorough outline of most of the historic buildings of many types in the Town.

# REVOLUTION ON THE CAPE AND ISLANDS



With the upcoming 250th anniversary of the American Revolution in 2026, the May program provided a series of highlights from a new book being prepared on the Revolution on Cape Cod and the Islands. This is a somewhat neglected topic in view of most people's associating the Revolution with Lexington, Concord, Bunker Hill, Valley Forge, etc.—when in actuality a number of important events and people in the Revolution were on the Cape and Islands. An example is the significant Otis family of

Barnstable. James Otis, Sr. was a judge in Barnstable, his son James, Jr. made fiery speeches through the decade of 1760-1770 which aroused the passion for revolution, and his sister Mercy—a well educated woman for her time—wrote a published a number of pieces related to the Revolutionary cause. David Martin outlined other Cape-centered and Island-centered events between 1761 and 1783, including shipwrecks and the Battle of Falmouth, which are part of the publication scheduled for availability by August of 2025.

### INTERVIEW WITH EDDIE THEW



Long-time Mills resident Eddie Thew was the focus of a fascinating interview by Society members at the June monthly meeting. Eddie recalled how his father built the house on Lakeside Drive after obtaining the land which had been part of the previous Roseland Ballroom -- an active place of entertainment in Marstons Mills in the 1930's. A vivid memory was recalling how the currently very busy Route 149 was vastly different in his childhood in the 1940s. He and a friend would sometimes sit in front of his house and wait to hear the rather rare event of a car approaching by listening for the engine in the distance. He described going to the Marstons Mills School, now a fu-

neral home on Route 28. His clear recall of many events of 70 years and more ago, together with his engaging laugh, made for an informative and entertaining afternoon. A video of the interview maybe viewed **HERE**
